

Water quality 'high,' village manager says

MT. KISCO — Mt. Kisco's water "has met and continues to meet the high water quality standards set by the State of New York Health Department," village manager J. Robert Dolan said in a report this week.

The report was in response to concerned inquiries following release last month of a federal Bureau of Water Hygiene report which indicated that several Westchester communities, including Mt. Kisco, had water supplies which were "potentially hazardous." Both local health officials and Everett MacLeman, head of the federal bureau's regional office, later took issue with the wording of the report as causing unnecessary alarm.

The village water department continuously samples its water for "bacterial content and physical and chemical properties," in accordance with state sanitary code requirements, Mr. Dolan said. These samples are analyzed by the county's Department of Laboratories and Research at Grasslands and copies of the results are forwarded to the county Health Department. This department also makes" checks of its own.

MR. DOLAN also noted that newspaper accounts of federal Bureau of Water Hygiene tests

"were in reference to raw water samples where bacteria counts are normally considerably higher than those taken at consumer points since they are collected at a point before chlorination treatment." For example, a 300 bacteria-

count sample taken from Byram Lake on August 18 compared to a one-count sample taken from the municipal building and a two-count sample taken from the Elks Club on the same date. Health department standards are that anything above a 240-count sample in one day or a 100count sample over a 30-day period is suspect.

'Our counts of one and two are therefore extremely good," Mr. Dolan commented. "The Byram Lake raw water sample shows that we should chlorinate our water as we do.'


